

1937 US PASSPORT

This prop is an authentic replica of a United States passport from the late 1930s.

Enter information on pages 2 and 3 of passport.

Option 1: Use built-in Adobe Acrobat form fields.

Option 2: Delete default form entries and print pages "blank." Use an actual typewriter or your choice of page layout software and fonts. (The **HPLHS Telegram** font is a close match for the real passport look.)

Print passport pages on ordinary white paper. The inside cover page (page 2 of this file) is printed on only one side. The visa pages are meant to be printed on both sides of the paper. Print pages 3-10 odd pages only; then reinsert paper into printer and print even pages only (so page 4 is on the back of page 3, page 6 is on the back of page 5, etc.).

Score at dashed lines, and **trim** at crop marks.

Starting with the inside cover page, put pages in correct order. **Sew**, if possible, or staple the pages together at the spine. **Fold pages** to form booklet insert.

Print cover on white or off-white cardstock, with a linen or leatherette texture, if possible. **Score** at dashed lines. **Cut out** cover, (TIP: round corners later, when passport is completely assembled). Fold cover in half on central scored line.

Insert page booklet snugly into cover, matching the top and bottom edges. Place passport on table surface, and carefully open front cover, preserving the positioning of the booklet within the cover. Apply glue to the inside surface of the front cover right up to the outer scored line. **Do not put glue directly on the spine.** Close front cover around the page booklet again, matching edges, and press down, securely gluing the cover to the booklet. Repeat this procedure with the back cover. When completed, the cover should be securely glued with free play between the scored lines of the spine.

Trim edges, if necessary, so that the closed booklet is even all around. **Round corners** of cover and pages at this time.

When passport is completely assembled, open front cover and lay booklet flat on surface. Using an X-act knife, **cut out** the white oval window in the front cover, revealing passport number.

Glue b/w photo of bearer to indicated page in passport. Stamp or glue in appropriate visas. Enter other information by hand.



A NOTE ABOUT PASSPORTS

Passports from different countries traditionally came in different styles, but after the first World War the League of Nations held a number of conferences in an attempt to standardize international transit and commerce. In the early/mid 'Twenties, a committee of the League of Nations recommended that all countries adopt a standard booklet-style passport, which was already common in some places. Although it usually ignored advice from the League, the U.S. gradually converted to the booklet style, and the US passport went through a couple of design changes in the time of Lovecraft. Hence, there are three styles of US passport in the HPLHS prop collection.

The fold-out, pre-League of Nations style is most appropriate for games set up to about 1926. The hardback booklet style is for games set in the late 1920s and early '30s, and this softback booklet style is for games set in the later 1930s - '60s.

CAUTION

This passport is a valuable document. It should not be altered in any way. Due care should be taken to see that it does not pass into the possession of an unauthorized person. If it is lost or destroyed the fact and circumstances of the loss should be immediately reported to the Passport Division, Department of State, or to the nearest American Consulate, or, in an outlying possession of the United States, to the chief executive thereof, and to the local police authorities. New passports in such cases can be issued only after exhaustive inquiry.

ABSTRACTS FROM PASSPORT REGULATIONS

1. Passports are issued in the United States by the Secretary of State, through the Passport Division, Department of State, Washington, D. C. Applications for passports should be made in person through clerks of Federal courts, clerks of State courts having jurisdiction in naturalization matters, or through passport agents of the Department of State. Passport agents of the Department of State are stationed at New York, Boston, Chicago, San Francisco, and the Department of State, Washington, D.C. Applications should be filed from 2 to 4 weeks before the passport is required, depending upon the distance from Washington.

2. Persons in the Philippine Islands desiring passports should make application to the United States High Commissioner, Manila. In the Virgin Islands, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, Guam, and American Samoa application should be made to the chief executives of those islands.

3. The passport fee, including \$1 for the execution of the application, is \$10. The fee for renewal of a passport is \$5. In the United States, passport and renewal fees should be submitted in currency or in postal money orders made payable to the Secretary of State, Washington, D. C.

4. The regulations provide that when the presumption of having ceased to be an American citizen has arisen against a naturalized American citizen under section 2 of the act of March 2, 1907, because of protracted foreign residence, his passport shall not be renewed until he shall have submitted to the Department of State or to a diplomatic or consular officer of the United States, evidence showing that the reason for such foreign residence comes within the rules prescribed by the Secretary of State whereunder such presumption may be overcome.

5. Americans making their homes or residing for a prolonged period abroad should register at the nearest American consulate.

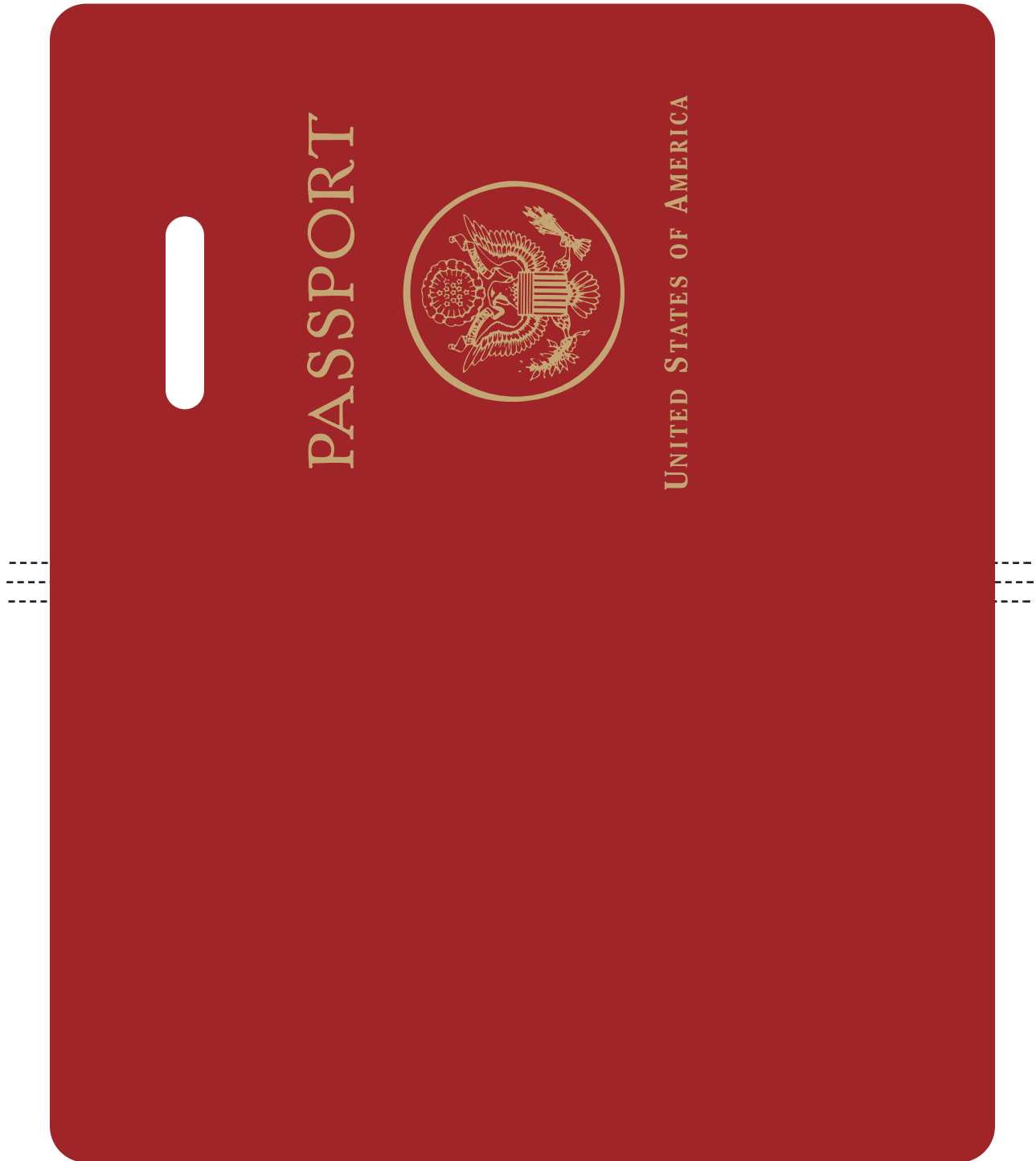
