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# Bornland

The Garethi spoken in Bornland is peppered with foreign terms, so Nivese- or Norbardic-sounding names are not uncommon here. Most people have first and last names, although serfs are an exception. They often carry no family name, and if they ever go abroad and need a more accurate designation for any reason, they call themselves after their place of origin.

Abbreviated or shortened first names, like Danja, Thila, Elko, and Ugo, are popular in Bornland. Pet names are formed by inserting *-ja*, *-ka*, or *-sha* at or near the end of a name. For example, Matjev becomes *Matjesha*, Maline becomes *Malinka*, and Elwine becomes *Elwinka* or *Elwinja*.

Nobles prefer to combine family names with hyphens, the results of which run the gamut from pompous, to menacing, and even to the ridiculous. Even so, a traveler would be wise not to laugh in a bronnjär's face if his name happens to sound funny in the traveler's native tongue...

# Nostria

*“Ablosion Vestvind of Dyckmoor. Phex be damned, they even lovingly call him Blowie! I’ve heard that the Nostrians are old-fashioned, but that’s no name for a knight! That’s an insult! And it doesn’t help that he pompously refers to himself as Rondrest.”*

As with their neighbors in the kingdom of Andergast, Nostrians favor traditional names that have been in use for centuries. Nobles, especially, have a predilection for adopting pompous, (allegedly) important-sounding names and titles.

Only city dwellers and those who live in larger settlements favor using last names. Those who live in the forest wilderness or on the dwelling mounds on the Sea of Seven Winds are content to add their place of origin or profession to their name, as needed. Those who can trace their ancestry to the first settlers still bear their family name with pride. It can be an entirely different situation when one comes into a fortune. A family such as *Knacker* can call itself *Destrier*, while Kasimir Cobbler can secretly change his name to Oldclothestrader.

# Andergast

Traditional names are particularly popular in the Warring Kingdoms, even though strangers often consider such names unwieldy and awkward. Instead of naming a son or daughter after the current ruler, an acquaintance, or even a stranger, people name their children after ancestors. Names with references to the earthmother, Sumu, are popular with nobles and commoners alike.

Many Andergastans prefer to use terms of endearment or abbreviations in everyday life. In this manner, names like Olderich shorten to *Olde*, and Trautgold becomes simply *Traute*.

Commoners rarely possess family names and thus usually call themselves after their place of origin: Osgar of Andrafall, Gerbald of the Forest, or Holde of Shovelfarm. Yeomen and townsfolk

usually wear their last names as proudly as nobles wear theirs. Outside of towns, especially, women commonly adopt the family name of their husband and then add an *-ess*. For example, when Marik Oakinger weds his sweetheart, Mila, she becomes known as *Mila Oakingeress*.
