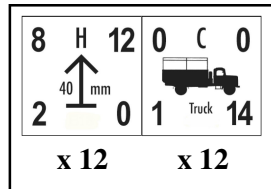
1st SA Anti-Tank Regiment



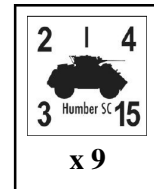

The 1st South Africa guarded the northern part of the Allied line in the Battle of Gazala. To help against possible German panzer attacks, they had almost a regiment of Matilda tanks attached and ready for action. While the major action took place 50 miles south, the South Africans enjoyed relative calm in their part of the front as the mostly Italian Infantry force in their front sat quietly, patiently waiting for the Allies to break in the south. By the middle of June, the Allies decided that the position was lost and the Africans were ordered to retreat to the Egyptian border, acting as a rear guard for part of the time.
