This brigade is attached from 6th Armored Division. Tank regiments are new and completely inexperienced in combat.

The 7th Armored Division had been refitted since Battleaxe and with the attached 22nd Brigade from the 6th Armored, they went into battle with 9 tank regiments. Though some of the old cruiser tanks were still in the ranks, the bulk of the armored strength consisted of the U.S. supplied Stuart tank and the Crusader. The job of the 7th in this operation was very much the same as in the last two attempts to relieve Tobruk. They were to cross the wire to the south and attempt to engage the German panzers in the open desert, destroying them with their superior numbers. The division was then supposed to swing to the north and help destroy the Axis forces on the frontier. They would then advance and link up with a breakout assault from Tobruk.

As the battle started, the 7th advanced into the Axis rear as planned but the division became scattered and vulnerable to counterattack. The German 21st Panzer and 90th Light Divisions were in place for a planned German operation of their own and in good position to attack the 7th. The Germans did attack and, after a major battle at Sidi Rezegh, the 7th Armored was left shattered and scattered.

After the Axis withdrawal began, the 7th engaged in the pursuit, although it consisted of little more than the 4th Brigade and a reduced support group. By the end of Operation Crusader, the division was only a shadow of its former self and was pulled back to spend 4 months refitting again.
